The Jazz Artistry of Peggy Lee And June Christy.

The marketplace is flooded right now with small boxed sets, capitalizing on the booming interest in jazz vocalists. And the big problem with most of them is that, in an effort to appear comprehensive, they leave so much out.

Many are no more than samplers, where great, classic performances alternate with contemporary recordings, sandwiched in to fill the disc and promote current catalogs. Others, despite the music's authenticity, provide only a smattering of recordings, some important, some obscure, that don't meet the demands of serious collectors.

None is as comprehensive, or as musically satisfying, as Mosaic's new set-our first vocal collection-featuring Peggy Lee and June Christy. To their legions of fans, it will be extraordinarily welcome. To listeners who know them only for their hit-parade top-charters, it will be an eye-opening surprise.

Timeless classics.

The fact is, Peggy Lee got her start singing with the Benny Goodman Orchestra; June Christy with Stan Kenton. In fact, they represent two of the last great popular singers to emerge from the big band tradition. These 1945 to 1946 recordings for Capitol, the songwriter's label (after all, Johnny Mercer was the founder) present these two inimitable singers in carefree and musically valid settings.

From the era when record companies promoted artists as vigorously as their recordings, these sides were never intended for commercial release. Originally recorded for radio station airplay only, they provided June and Peggy the opportunity to sing the songs they wanted to sing-often timeless jazz classics-rather than the songs the jukebox crowd was demanding. They are standouts for the repertoire selected, and extraordinarily collectible because they are so rare.

A contrast in styles.

You'll hear Peggy Lee backed by the Frank DeVol orchestra on some tunes, but accompanied on most by an intimate quartet led by her husband, guitarist Dave Barbour (they met working for Goodman). Influenced by both Billie Holiday and Ethel Waters, Peggy made sure you always knew who was singing, with her careful respect for the lyrics and her very distinctive, bluesy, liquid approach to pitch.

June Christy, accompanied by such Kentonites as Ray Wetzel, Kai Winding, Boots Mussulli, Bob Cooper and Shelly Manne, displays a natural, rough-and-tumble coolness that, matched with her cherry pie looks, made her such an endearing figure in music. The effect she had on listeners can only be gauged by the numerous tributes to her talent you can read today on web sites devoted to hermany of them recollections of high school and college dates close to fifty years ago when June, in performance, planted lifelong memories.

Outstanding sound quality.

Each and every track on the Mosaic set has been newly transferred directly from the original Capitol acetates to digital tape by master technician Malcolm Addey, using Apogee A to D converters and the Cedar de-clicker. In other words- they sound great.

Twenty-seven selections by June Christy and a whopping 72 by Peggy Lee make this a collection to remember, to study, to enjoy.

The booklet includes essays by Will Friedwald, photographs of the actual sessions and a complete discography of the collection.
